A Note From our Pastor

How wonderful to see the church filled to capacity on Easter Sunday. Did you realize that during the first Easter service one of the disciples was missing? Can you imagine that? Of all the services to miss, how could Thomas miss the very first Easter service? John 20:19-31 records the event. The writer tells us the other disciples were behind closed doors and Jesus appeared before them. He blessed them and then showed them his hands and his side before commissioning them to do the work they were called to do. In verse 24 we read, "But Thomas (who was called the Twin), one of the twelve, was not with them when Jesus came." There is no explanation why Thomas was absent. The fact is that we really don't know where he was or what he was doing. He may have been in hiding, for we are told that when Jesus appeared to the other disciples they were in fear behind locked doors. Jesus did not go to Calvary just so we have another holiday or even to stimulate the economy with people doing additional shopping. He went to the cross because he loves you. He emerged from the tomb, leaving it empty, to announce that eternal life is yours and mine, through his love.

The spirit of Christ's love has been placed within us and because of that we can never be the same. The spirit of Easter is planted in our very being. We are now to cultivate and grow that planting. ASP 2011 – Mingo County, West Virginia July 24th – July 30th

We are very excited to announce that this summer St. John's will be living the ASP theme: "Follow the Word & Transform the World" with **THREE** teams on our ASP mission trip to Mingo County, WV, the week of July 24-July 30. We are excited to have this opportunity to serve our AWESOME God by helping families in need in Central Appalachia as we embark on our 22^{nd} year with ASP.

Every year, more than 12,000 youth from around the country come to rural Central Appalachia to help Appalachia Service Project (ASP) repair homes for low-income families. They bring boundless energy and spread tons of hope. ASP'S goal is to make homes warmer, safer, and drier for needy families throughout Kentucky, Tennessee, Virginia, and West Virginia. We might install insulation, repair porches or reinforce foundations; but ASP is much more than just a building program – forging friendships and sharing God's love is just as important as swinging hammers. We'll get to know the families we're serving, we'll meet volunteers from other churches and we'll come home with a renewed and strengthened faith because of our experience.

This summer St. Johns will be taking 10 adults and 11 youth to join approximately 450 other church groups in a week of service at one of the 28 ASP Summer Centers. These groups will spend Monday through Friday repairing the homes of families caught in economic despair. After a few days of hard work repairing homes with ASP, their hands will become a little tougher, their arms a little stronger, and their relationships with God a whole lot deeper. In the evenings, they will learn more about poverty issues and Appalachian culture, process their daily activities, and enjoy recreation and fellowship with new-found friends. They will return home with a passion for service, a renewed compassion for other people, and a fresh appreciation for their place and purpose in this world.

This year's theme, "Follow the Word, Transform the World" is based on Romans 12:2 "Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your minds, so that you may discern what is the will of God – what is good and acceptable and perfect."

ASP volunteers are strongly committed to serving the Lord by preparing themselves mentally, physically and spiritually for this mission. Much is expected of an ASP group!!! Studying, teambuilding, fundraising and following Christ will all be part of our ASP experience.

This year as we travel to Mingo County, West Virginia, to be the "Hands and Feet" of Christ, we ask for your prayers and your encouragement as a lot of us are stepping outside our comfort zone and depending on our faith and our God to strengthen and enable us to participate in this life changing mission.

Appalachia's poorest families urgently need our help, but they will change our lives too. Because when you put your faith in action, God acts in your heart. And when you change the lives of

others, they have a way of changing you. We need your help to make a lasting dent in Appalachian poverty. So if you are interested in supporting your St. John's ASP teams, we ask that you consider sponsoring us with a donation to help us to cover the cost of this week of service.

The cost for one week on ASP is \$50 per day, per volunteer. With 21 enthusiastic volunteers, we need your help! All money contributed is 100% tax-deductible, greatly appreciated and is used to pay for work supplies and materials, our transportation to Mingo County and room & board at a school in the community we serve. If you are able to make a donation in any amount, please make your check payable to St. John's UMC, and in the memo section, write "ASP 2011" to ensure proper credit. You can then mail your check to St. John's or put it in the offertory plate on any Sunday.

A Note from the CELT

No God, No Peace - Know God, Know Peace! That's what the bumper sticker on the car in front of me said while I sat parked along one of the seemingly endless construction stretches along the Capital Beltway. It was a good time to pause and think about that bumper sticker and the meaning behind it.

The Apostle Paul said, "Be anxious for nothing, but in everything by prayer and supplication, with thanksgiving, let your requests be made known to God; and the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and minds through Christ Jesus." (Philippians 4:6-7).

Recent surveys show membership in most churches dropping in the last decades. Attendance in Sunday Schools and Worship services have waned (1.6 Million in 1968 to 846,000 in 2009 - from www.churchsociety.org). In this "Information Age," media-hype, false data, impressions, blogs, and individual agendas pervade the communication waves. This has always been true since the beginnings of the early Christian church when various persons and personalities struggled to lead the new Christian believers.

How do we get to know God - and peace -- if we don't try to learn the scripture given us in the Bible? Learning scripture through Bible Studies and Sunday School educates us in the stories of Christ and the Bible. By doing so, we can know the truth of the Word as a light and an anchor to hold on to when our behavior, belief and value systems are challenged.

Dear Parents:

We are looking forward to an exciting Vacation Bible School at St John's UMC, July 11-15, 2011! At "Hometown Nazareth - Where Jesus Was a Kid," your child will experience life in Nazareth through Bible scripture, stories, the marketplace setting, a storyteller, arts and crafts, snacks and songs.

The VBS morning program will take place from 9:00 AM to Noon, for children 3 years (potty-trained) to rising 6th graders. Cost for attending the Vacation Bible School is \$10 and is due with Registration. Checks can be made payable to St John's UMC (note: "VBS 2011").

An afternoon Music Camp, 12:45 - 3:45 PM is featured for children 4 years to rising 6th graders, where they will sing and learn to play musical instruments. There is no charge for attending Music Camp. NOTE: There is no afternoon program for 3-year olds. Three-year old children will need to be picked up by parents at Noon.
